It wasn't till I joined HSA that I went from a quiet caterpillar to a social butterfly seeking the answers to the world! I was an officer from Fall 22'-Spring 23', in which I was one of the 3 leaders of the "The Food Picture: Hunger in NWA." I got the pleasure to present our research about food insecurity within NWACC alongside Thanai Hill and Ally Davidson (Figure 1), and during the Spring Arts and Culture Festival we got the chance to present with Cathy May, Jennie Popp, and Daniel Smith. The NWACC focused data revolved around how our campus felt about food prices increasing, accessibility to food and resources, and overall, who were the ones taking the strongest hit to the falling economy? Throughout the semester there were of course other HSA related projects such as "Blind Date with a Book" (Figure 2), "Game Nights" (Figure 3), and our "J-Street Clean-Up"(Figure 4). Over time, even though I gave up my officer position, I was still active within HSA and was a helping hand whenever I got the chance to do so! Although there were other programs that I participated in that brought me out of my little world, HSA was a step forward in engaging more with the school and in general with my community.

Aside from HSA, I also participated in the Latinx on The Rise Mentorship Program dedicated to giving Latino students the opportunity to be mentored by another fellow Latino who is already the industry they are wanting to work in. I did this program with my good friend and fellow Honors student Rosa Aldana and Dani E.Q. as we participated in networking and learning events (picture on the left). These ranged from the DECA Annual Gala to the 2023 Inaugural Civic Engagement Trip where we got to visit: the William J. Clinton Library and Museum, Clinton School of Public Service, Little Rock Central High School Museum, and Arkansas Capital. This was during the time the Mega-Bill (the Learns Act) was being passed, and I got to engage in healthy conversations about the questions I had about the Act with an Arkansas Representative. Not only that, but we met lobbyist Mireya Reith who is the first Hispanic woman on the Arkansas Board of Education and is now the head of the non-profit *Arkansas United*, whose goal is to help educate the



immigrants of Arkansas on resources available to them (picture on the right). My mentor Marina Narvaez gave me a lot of wisdom when it comes to networking with people, which was a big factor as to why interacting with all different types of people comes easily to me. I'd like to think that this also gave me the chance to participate in a lot of side quests, like being the youngest judge for the Bentonville 2023 Wild West Invitational Debate Competition with no Debate experience but tons of MUN tools under my belt like those used in Debate. Although this isn't sponsored by the Honors Program, I was still highly encouraged to join by honors professors and peers.


Explore Perspectives:

These included things such as the Hunger Project we did with HSA, the Voting Project done by Braiden Burton, all as we brushed on the concept of what Honors Arkansas is.
